




<h3>State Bird</h3>  <p>In 1949, the American Robin (<i>Turdus migratorius</i>) was chosen the state bird. School children across the state, voted to name the Robin the state bird in 1926-27. Many years later the robin was adopted as the state bird.</p>	<h3>State Flower</h3>  <p>In 1949, the Wood Violet was designated the state flower. In 1908 it was selected as the State flower by a vote of school children in 1908. It became the official state flower in 1949.</p>	<h3>State Tree</h3>  <p>In 1949, the Sugar Maple was chosen the state tree. It was chosen by a vote of school children in 1893 and by a second vote of school children in 1948.</p>
<h3>State Fish</h3>  <p>In 1955, the Muskellunge (musky) was designated as the state fish. The world record for a caught musky is one that weighed 70 lbs. They are strong fish and fighters and difficult to catch.</p>	<h3>State Animal</h3>  <p>In 1957, the Badger was designated the state animal. It has been associated with Wisconsin since territorial days. The state is nicknamed "The Badger State", which refers to the nickname given to the miners in the 1800s.</p>	<h3>State Domestic Animal</h3>  <p>In 1971, the Dairy Cow was adopted the state domestic animal. Agriculture is an important part of Wisconsin's economy and its farmers rank high in the production of milk, butter, and cheese.</p>
<h3>State Mineral</h3>  <p>In 1971, Galena was adopted as the state mineral. It was chosen the state mineral because of its abundance, uniqueness, economic value, and historical significance. Mining of galena (lead ore) was the principal occupation of the settlers of early Wisconsin,</p>	<h3>State Rock</h3>  <p>In 1971, Red Granite was adopted as the state rock. 
Wisconsin State Bird: Robin




Wisconsin State Tree: Sugar Maple
